Educators Are Integrating AI into Instruction and Planning

Institutions that pair AI adoption with clear governance, faculty training, and responsible-use policies may be better positioned to meet growing expectations for individualized learning experiences.

Teachers Are Leveraging AI More for Preparation Than Instruction

As reported by the RAND American Teacher Panel's 2025 survey of 2,232 U.S. public K-12 teachers, AI is primarily being used to support educator productivity. With stronger governance and training frameworks emerging, schools have an opportunity to leverage AI more broadly to enhance teaching, personalize learning, and improve student support.

Reflecting this shift, teaching responsible AI use and developing AI literacy skills ranked among the top expectations stakeholders have for schools.

Prompting the Next Generation

As AI becomes increasingly embedded in how students learn, research, and complete coursework, the focus for schools is shifting from managing AI use to developing AI literacy. Schools that establish clear guidance, teach responsible use, and help students strengthen critical thinking alongside AI skills may be better positioned to prepare graduates for college, careers, and an increasingly AI-driven workforce.

Schools that strategically integrate AI across finance, HR, enrollment, and advancement may be better positioned to improve operational efficiency, make more informed decisions, and redirect staff time toward initiatives that support students, families, and long-term institutional growth.
